We are committed to the preservation of the history of roller skating. With over 40 display cases, the museum educates the public on all aspects of roller skating, which dates back to the first patented skate from 1819.

Curator's Corner

Sign Meeting

On February 16, I met with the Historic Preservation Commission. Here the museum presented its idea for a sign design to be located outside of the building. If anyone forgot the proposed sign, here it is again:



After viewing the image, the commission unanimously voted to accept our design.

Secondly, the commission granted our request to remove a tree in order to put the sign in a prominent place. The tree annually loses large branches that land very close to the building and would eventually hit it. As a compromise, the museum and USARS volunteered to plant two trees to counteract the removal of one. This was greatly appreciated by the commission.

Production on the sign can then began once our city site plan is changed to showcase our new sign location. Much work has gone into this project. Originally chosen for a sign grant in the summer of 2011, our goal is to have the sign up and functional by the end of spring 2012.

Skater Profile: William Carpenter Scientific Skater

Born in Lowell, Massachusetts in 1891, Billy Carpenter became one of the premier fancy, figure, and scientific skaters of his time. He began his rise to the top on ice skates until the age of twelve, when he switched to rollers.

He began on rollers as a skate boy and caught the attention of a Canadian coach named H.T. Frennette for his skating. In 1907 Carpenter began touring the East with great success, and the following year this same tour route was booked solid. In 1909 he joined forces with Providence skater Jack Reilly, and the duo was known as "the Yankee Clowns." By 1910 they had introduced other aspects to their act, like comedy and acrobatics and even played vaudeville circuits. Reilly then ended the partnership in 1911.

For the next few years, Carpenter managed rinks. These were located in New Bedford (MA), Augusta (ME), Farmington (ME), and Springfield (MA). He also performed in a 20 week tour with the Helen Carlos Trio.

Skate of the Week: Ritter Road Skate




Produced by the Road Skate Company of London circa 1890, this Ritter Road Skate promises ankle support to those skaters with problems balancing properly.

An advertisement suggests: "our skates are fitted with an automatic brake which enables one to skate up hill, and let splints which entirely take all strain off of the ankles."



Library Feature: Roller Derby By Catherine Mabe



Author Catherine Mabe is a founding member of her local roller derby team: the Rocky Mountain Rollergirls. Also known as Jayne Manslaughter, Mabe showcases her love for the sport of derby by writing this book in 2007. Our museum is even credited in assisting, with multiple photographs showcased throughout.

She devotes different chapters to the explanation of the sport. The book begins with the back story on how derby began in the United States. Mabe describes how derby began as an endurance race before transforming into a high-contact, team sport. She mentions some of the great derby participants such as Joan Weston and Ann Calvello. Derby even made a comeback with the televised sport of *Roller Jam* in the late 1990s.

The book then shifts towards the individual. Mabe brings to light why women join derby. She highlights how an ordinary librarian or lawyer can have a quiet life off the track, but once she straps on the skates, she can become quite a different person.


The book then focuses on the names of skaters. It takes into account all the planning and brainstorming needed to come up with the perfect derby name. Mabe gives many examples such as Roxy Balboa, Juanna Rumbel, Sharon Needles, and Dinah-Mite.


The story then ends with how real derby is and its rules. Mabe tells stories and shows pictures of bruises, brakes, and scrapes. The rules of the games are broken down, as well as terminology.
