
Curator's Corner


Donation Received



Robert Hoskin developed and patented a braking system for the Rollerblade model Coyote inline skate. Hoskin has now donated to the museum his official U.S. patent along with parts, prototypes, pictures, and a pair of Coyote skates. The museum plans to incorporate his donation into an exhibit featuring the process of this patent idea from start to finish. Hoskin explains his idea:

This invention relates generally to braking and cooling systems and more particularly to high heat transfer braking systems capable of simultaneously applying braking forces to multiple rolling members and cooling systems for rapidly cooling rotation members.

This patent consists of twenty-three claims and nine drawings. These claims and drawings further explain what this new braking system does and how it improves the previous method.



Featured Story Skating Floors and Surfaces


One of the most important aspects to a roller skating rink is the skating floor. The following qualities are essential to a successful surface: durability, traction, smoothness, resiliency, quietness, and cleanliness.

There are many types of skating surfaces available. Surface types include maple, chipboard, terrazzo, asphalt, and concrete. Skating floors should then be coated with a plastic finish, with a possible exception of maple. Each type of floor has its own positives and negatives for the owner and skater.

Maple floors have long been considered the premier roller skating floor material. Specifically, Northern Maple provides the hardness and durability necessary for the pounding the skating floor takes. The high cost dissuades many rinks from imploring this type of floor. While almost mandatory for skating floors during the roller skating hey-day, maple floors today are more scarce do to the cost on upkeep. Of course a plastic coating is necessary to prevent dust and use of harsh abrasive powders for cleaning.

Terrazzo, once a popular choice, saw a short shelf life of interest. A mixture of small marble chips that was then set in cement, Terrazzo wass then polished until the surface was smooth. The marble flakes gave a good eye appeal to the floor and could vary depending on the marble used. The installation process was daunting and expensive; cracks were common with poor installation.

Chipboard consists of wood chips bonded together through heat, pressure, and glue in board form with a high density binder. Commonly set upon a concrete base as a sound subsurface, chipboard can be installed two ways: first, a direct application to concrete or asphalt using mastic or epoxy compounds, and second, a free floating system of installation allows for expansion and movement.

Concrete floors provide a less costly floor from both installations to upkeep. The levelness of the subfloor and condition of the concrete finish play a leading role in the success of the final epoxy skating surface. A primary objective is a moisture-free concrete floor. Special care must be taken to avoid trowel ridge lines or an extremely rough broom finish as this will have a definite effect on the ultimate skating surface.

Another economical floor type, asphalt flooring was also a popular choice. When coated with plastic, the floors were extremely quiet, resistant of water damage, and easily reparable. However, temperature variations could cause cracking.

Other hardwood floors also warranted some experimentation. Southern maple, oak, and pecan floors appeared in varied locations. While not equivalent in hardness to the maple, with a plastic coating this type of floor has been functional.
